Seal Leaks to Cut Energy Use in Manufactured Home

If the utility bill for your manufactured home seems too high, it could be the result of leaks. Here are some tips from Lamar Electric Cooperative that can help you stop the leaks from your home—and your wallet.

Older manufactured homes, especially those built before 1994, may have leaking ducts and inadequate insulation. Leaky ductwork can reduce the efficiency of your heating and cooling system by as much as 20 percent. A good time to check for leaks is on a windy day, when you'll be able to find drafty spots in your home.

Experts recommend going after the big leaks first. That means plugging all holes around chimneys, vents, water pipes and ductwork. Leaky ducts can be sealed with mastic sealant. Avoid the use of duct tape, which can dry out and disintegrate when used on ductwork. Adding insulation to floor, wall and ceiling cavities can improve energy efficiency, but may be a job for a professional contractor.

Once you've sealed the major leaks, look for smaller ones—around windows, doors, electrical outlets and light switches. Seal gaps around windows and doors, using caulk on nonmoving parts. And replace any worn weatherstripping. Caulk or expanding spray foam can be used where plumbing, wiring, vents and ducting penetrate through walls. Installing foam outlet gaskets in electrical outlets and light switches—especially on outside walls—can save energy, too.

And for safety's sake, make sure that all combustion appliances, such as furnaces, stoves and water heaters, are properly vented.

Tax Credits To Expire in December

If you need new windows, roofing, insulation or an air conditioner, consider replacing them by December 31.

That's when the federal tax credit for energy-efficient home improvements expires.

For qualifying products that you have installed by the end of the year, you can take a tax credit of up to \$1,500 on your 2010 taxes. You can claim the credit on 30 percent of the cost of the following products:

- Windows, doors and skylights
- Metal or asphalt roofs (other kinds don't qualify)
- Insulation
- Electric heat-pump water heaters; gas, oil or propane water heaters
- Air-conditioning and heating systems
- Biomass stoves

You can claim the credit on 30 percent of the cost of

the following products—with no limit at all—until the end of 2016:

- Geothermal heat pumps
- Solar panels
- Solar water heaters
- Small wind-energy systems
- Fuel cells

THE CATCH: The requirements for each product are very specific. Not every product is eligible for the tax credit; not even every energy-efficient or Energy Star product is eligible.

So don't assume that you'll qualify for the tax credit just because you're buying an energy-efficient device in one of these categories. Double-check before you buy by visiting the federal government's Energy Star page at www.energystar.gov.

Deer Hunting Safety Tips

1. Treat every firearm as though it's loaded.
2. Look carefully BEYOND the animal you're shooting at before you pull the trigger.
3. When walking, your gun should be pointed straight down at the ground, and the safety should be on.
4. Wear hunter orange going to and from your stand.
5. Allergic to bee or wasp stings? Take along an EpiPen (an auto-injector used to treat anaphylactic shock).
6. Wear good, supportive footwear.
7. Avoid dehydration by taking liquids with you.
8. DO NOT place a deer stand against an electric pole.
9. DO NOT hunt in electric company rights-of-way.
10. When hunting, if you see a downed power line, assume it's energized and report it.
