

# The Turtles Are Leaving



## MESSAGE FROM GENERAL MANAGER AND CEO JERRY D. WILLIAMS

**A LITTLE TURTLE HAS BEEN HIDING** on the bottom side of your electric meter. They were put there almost 20 years ago and have been slowly doing their job of sending us a meter reading each day. When they were installed years ago, this was innovative technology and virtually eliminated the need for meter readers.

The printed circuit boards were called Turtles because the packets of information containing the meter reading moved very slowly. It took all day for the five numbers on each electric meter register to travel from the meter, through the power lines to our substation. Slow and steady was good because the amount of electricity you used was only calculated once each month.



Over the past few years, many of our Turtle modules have quit transmitting, which resulted in hundreds of meters being replaced each year. The electric meters still worked, but the Turtle transmitting modules would quit sending a reading each day and eventually stop sending us the reading. All the Turtle modules are now outdated. The oldest Turtle modules are no longer made which has resulted in a lot of meters being read by hand each month. A solution had to be found. See “The Turtles Are Slowing Down” in the June 2014 issue of Texas Co-op Power.

After researching the currently available meter reading

technology, we decided the most cost-effective way to read meters was still through the electric wires. The Two Way Automated Communication System was the most efficient and least costly solution. The software the TWACS system uses is completely different than the Turtles system, so new modern equipment had to be installed in each substation to link up with a server in our office that manages the entire system.

We could have retrofitted the old meters with the new TWACS modules, but it was more cost effective to have new General Electric digital meters shipped from the GE factory to the TWACS factory where the TWACS modules were installed. This made the field work as simple as swapping meters. We will probably retrofit some of the more expensive commercial meters with the new TWACS module.

Yes, we are changing out all the residential meters. No, they are not the “Smart” meters. The TWACS meter reading system has no radio transmitter and there are no radio waves. We cannot control anything in your house or even monitor any of your appliances. We have been reading meters through the electric wires for almost 20 years and we will continue reading meters through those same electric wires.

The new meter reading system will help us provide more reliable power. After a large outage, we can “ping” all the meters in an area to determine if everyone’s power came back on. We can then dispatch a lineman to each location that did not come back on when the main line was energized.

Instead of one meter reading each day, we can download hourly meter readings. This has already been useful for helping members discover the cause for high electric usage. In many cases we will be able to turn power off or on from our office, thus eliminating the wait when you move locations.

We will be adding more usage data to our online web site. Go to [lamarelectric.coop](http://lamarelectric.coop) and click “Online Bill Pay.” You will be asked to set up a password that will give you access to your account information. You do not have to pay your bill online, but that is an option. We now call this information site “SmartHub.” If you want, you can download the SmartHub App to your smart phone or tablets, and view your information from anywhere.

To implement the new meter reading system we have already changed a large portion of the meters and will be working hard to replace the remainder, later this year. The new meters are NOT smart meters. Nothing is wrong with your meter. A lot of the Turtles are getting old and need to be replaced with an updated system.

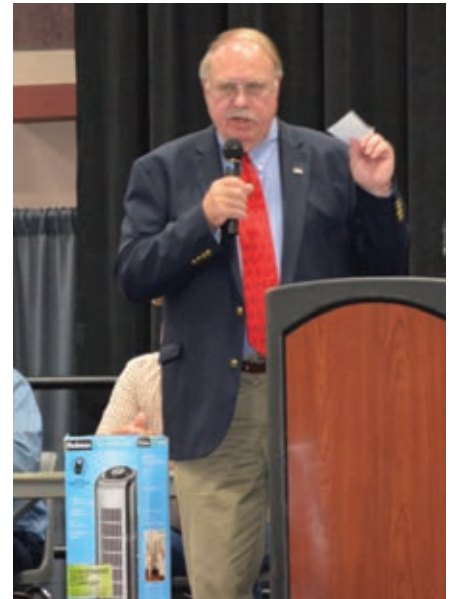
